RAY MILLETTE CONCERTO COMPETITION

When violist Ray Millette, a beloved member of the Alhambra Orchestra, passed away, a musical memorial service was held. Donations given at that event were used to begin a new initiative, a concerto competition for middle and high-school students in Miami-Dade, Monroe, Broward and Palm Beach Counties. The competition is part of our initiative to promote music education. The top three winners receive cash prizes and an opportunity to rehearse and perform as soloists with the Alhambra Orchestra. Last year, when the pandemic prevented our meeting with a large ensemble or performing for a live audience, we created a video concert with the winners that we placed on YouTube. This is the eighteenth year of the competition. Prior winners have gone on to prestigious conservatories and college music programs, as well as international competitions.

DANIEL ANDAI

Artistic Director & Conductor



Hailed as an "Exemplary Leader" by the New York Times for leading members of the New York Philharmonic and Manhattan School of Music in Carnegie Hall, violinist Daniel Andai has shared his versatile artistry as a soloist, recitalist, chamber musician, concertmaster, conductor and recording artist in major concert venues in over fifty countries. has shared his versatile artistry as a soloist, recitalist, chamber musician, concertmaster, conductor and recording artist in major concert venues in over 50 countries.

He is a prizewinner of numerous competitions and soloed with orchestras around the world. Daniel Andai was concertmaster and frequent soloist of the Philharmonic Orchestra of the Americas in New York with whom he recorded multiple Billboard rated SONY Classical CD's. He has guest conducted, performed as soloist, and held the concertmaster position with the Miami Symphony Orchestra (MISO) since 2010. He has appeared as guest concertmaster with orchestras in Mexico, Brazil, Switzerland, and France, performed in the sections of New York Philharmonic and Miyazaki Festival Orchestra (Japan), and worked closely with members of major string quartets, symphony, opera, and ballet orchestras around the world. As an educator, he brings a multifaceted style of teaching, suited for students of all ages and competencies. He connects with students by harnessing critical thinking, passion, and energy, to inspire skillful artistry. The greatest impact to his students is found in the creative interlacing between technique and self-confidence. By facilitating his students' creative development, he believes they can find ways to transfer skills between a music career or to an array of other workforce areas to help them best serve their communities. Dr. Daniel Andai is Dean of the Music Division at New World School of the Arts where he is the Chief Academic Officer, responsible for operating a music partnership between Miami Dade College, University of Florida, and Miami Dade County Public Schools. He is Artistic Director of Killington Music Festival (Killington, Vermont), Artistic Director and Principal Conductor of Alhambra Orchestra in Miami. Previously, he served as violin professor and Marialice Shivers Endowed Chair in Fine Arts at University of Texas in Edinburg and served on faculties at Miami-Dade College and New World School of the Arts, in addition to over 30 summer music festivals. During this time, he has worked some of the world's greatest classical and pop artists.

He has served on boards and advisory boards, been invited to serve as a panelist for Jeb and Columba Bush's Arts4Life organization and has performed for numerous world dignitaries, including Hilary Clinton, Donald Trump, Lech Walesa, Al Gore, Benjamin Netanyahu, among others. He has performed with countless recognized artists in the pop and classical fields. Daniel Andai is an alumnus of University of Miami (DMA), Manhattan School of Music (PS & MM), Lynn University (BM), New World School of the Arts (HS), Miami Dade College and Killington Music Festival.





IAN BARNETT, VIOLIN

First place winner, is a junior at Ransom Everglades School. He began playing the violin at the age of four. Ian has won many national competitions, such as the Homestead Concerto Competition,

International Protégé Concerto Competition at Carnegie

Hall, Musical International Grand Prix, Canadian International Competition and, Vivo Competition (Judges Pick). He has also performed various times as a soloist for the Greater Miami Youth Symphony and the Alhambra Orchestra and was named a Semi Finalist in the 2020-2021 Sphinx Competition. This year lan is the Concertmaster at the Greater Miami Youth Symphony. He has attended music summer camps at the Young Musician's Advanced Camp at UM, Music in the Mountains Program in Durango, Colorado, the Heifetz PEG program in Staunton, Virginia from 2017-2019, and the Sphinx Performance Academy. Ian has also won the Greater Miami Youth Symphony concerto competition this year and will be performing with GMYS on March 12. He presently studies with Misha Vitenson and Michael Klotz. Ian is also a composer who has won many prizes for his orchestra, chamber and piano pieces that have been performed by professional musicians. These include the YCP in Washington State, the Salome 2017 Young Artist Composition Competition in New York, the Miami Conservatory of Music Composition Competition and the National Young Composer's Challenge Competition in Florida. He has twice been named a finalist in the ASCAP Young Composers Competition.





ROBERT FORNOS, VIOLA

second place winner, is a senior at Coral Reef Senior High School. He started on piano at the age of eight and began learning the viola when he was nine. As a violist, Robert has attended

several festivals, including the Florida Music Education

Association's All-State Festival, the Josef Gingold Chamber Music Festival, the Heifetz International Institute, and the New World Symphony's Side by Side Ensemble. Robert is a student of Michael Klotz. Additionally, he has had the pleasure of working with renowned musicians, including Paul Coletti, Roberto Diaz, Mark Jackobs, Katharina Kang, Gary Levinson, Mai Motobuchi, Paul Neubauer, Milena Pajaro-van de Stadt, Felix Ungar, and Barbara Westphal. Robert also enjoys studying math and science. Having also excelled in the Greater Miami Youth Symphony's concerto competition this year, he will be performing next week, March 12th, with the GMYS orchestra.





ISABELA DIAZ, VIOLIN

Third place winner, is a junior at the New World School of the Arts. She is currently studying violin with Huifang Chen and Jose Guibert. In 2021, she won both FSMTA District and State Concerto

Competitions (Senior Division), Honorable Mention

in Florida Federation of Music Clubs State Competition (Violin Solo Advanced II), and Semi-finalist at the Sphinx Competition (Junior division). She has participated in community orchestras including the Greater Miami Youth Symphony and Miami Music Project, giving her the opportunity to play under the direction of renowned conductors Itzhak Perlman, Michael Tilson Thomas, Carlos Miguel Prieto, Maximiliano Valdes, Robert McDuffie, Stephane Deneve and James Judd, among others. In 2015, she participated in the GMYS Concerto Competition and won first place at the String Orchestra Division. In 2016, she participated at the Bravo! MusicLab Finale Concert in the New World Center as Concertmaster. From 2017 to 2021, she was selected to participate in the Florida All-State Orchestra. Additionally, she participated in the Superintendent's Honors Music Festival organized by the Miami Dade Public Schools in the last few years. In 2019, she performed in the New World Symphony Side by Side Concert, the Sphinx Performance Academy at Curtis Institute of Music and played at Carnegie Hall as a member of the National Youth Orchestra 2 of the United States.



COMPOSERS

Felix Mendelssohn (1809-1847) was a German composer, pianist, organist and conductor of the early Romantic period. An immensely gifted child, Felix was given a thorough musical education but his parents did not place him or his compositions before the public until he was older. Among his accomplishments was the revival of interest in the music of J.S. Bach, which had been nearly forgotten. Mendelssohn himself was to suffer a similar fate after the end of his very successful adult career, but he is now among the most popular composers of all time. Mendelssohn's most famous compositions include the overture and incidental music for A Midsummer Night's Dream, the Italian Symphony, the Scottish Symphony, the oratorio St. Paul, the oratorio Elijah, the overture The Hebrides, the Violin Concerto and the String Octet. The Violin Concerto in E minor, written for a violinist friend, had its premiere in Leipzig in 1845. Composed at the height of Mendelssohn's powers, the concerto became an instant classic and a cornerstone of the violin repertoire.

Bela Bartok (1881-1945), born in Hungary, gave his first piano recital at age 11 including one of his own compositions. He studied at the Royal Academy of Music in Budapest, and was also influenced by music of R. Strauss, Debussy, and Brahms. Together with composer Zoltan Kodaly, a close friend, Bartok devoted many years to collecting and analyzing the folk music of the Hungarian countryside and incorporating its idiom into classical works. Moving to the United States in 1940, Bartok was known mainly as a pianist, ethnomusicologist and teacher, while he continued to compose. The Viola Concerto, commissioned by eminent violist William Primrose, was unfinished at Bartok's death; the solo was completed but the orchestra parts merely sketched. The orchestration was completed by Bartok's friend Tibor Serly, and the concerto was premiered in 1949 by the Minneapolis Symphony Orchestra with Primrose as soloist.

Camille Saint-Saens (1835-1921) was a French composer, organist, conductor and pianist of the late Romantic era. His best-known works include Introduction and Rondo Capriccioso, the Second Piano Concerto, the First Cello Concerto, Danse Macabre, and Carnival of the Animals. Premiered in 1894, his violin showpiece Havanaise was written for a Cuban violinist and is based on the habanera rhythm. Saint-Saëns was a musical prodigy; he made his concert debut at the age of ten. After studying at the Paris Conservatoire he followed a career as a church organist and later, as a freelance pianist and composer, in demand in Europe and the Americas. As a young man, Saint-Saëns adored the "modern" music of the day, particularly that of Schumann, Liszt and Wagner, although his own compositions were generally within a conventional classical tradition. Saint-Saëns' students included Gabriel Fauré, among whose own later pupils was Maurice Ravel. Both of them were strongly influenced by Saint-Saëns, whom they revered as a genius.



Richard Wagner (1813-1883) was a German composer, theatre director, polemicist, and conductor who is chiefly known for his operas. Wagner revolutionized opera, synthesizing the poetic, visual, musical and dramatic arts. His compositions, particularly those of his later period, are notable for their complex textures, rich harmonies and orchestration. His advances in musical language, such as extreme chromaticism and quickly shifting tonal centres, greatly influenced the future development of classical music. His Tristan und Isolde is sometimes described as marking the start of modern music. But Wagner's personal life was turbulent and many of his social theories deplorable, particularly his anti-Semitic views. A completely different side of Wagner, however, appears in the achingly tender Siegfried Idyll, which was written and performed as a surprise birthday present for his wife in 1870.

Maurice Ravel (1875-1937) was a French composer, pianist and conductor. He is often associated with Impressionism along with his elder contemporary Claude Debussy, although both composers rejected the term. In the 1920s and 1930s Ravel was internationally regarded as France's greatest living composer. Born to a music-loving family, Ravel attended France's premier music college, the Paris Conservatoire; he was not well regarded by its conservative establishment, whose biased treatment of him caused a scandal. After leaving the conservatoire, Ravel found his own way as a composer, developing a style of great clarity and incorporating elements of modernism, baroque, neoclassicism and, in his later works, jazz. He liked to experiment with musical form, as in his best-known work, Boléro (1928), in which repetition takes the place of development. Renowned for his orchestration, Ravel made some orchestral arrangements of other composers' piano music, of which his 1922 version of Mussorgsky's Pictures at an Exhibition is the best known. Ravel described his Pavane for a Dead Princess as "an evocation of a pavane that a little princess might...have danced at the Spanish court." This antique miniature is not meant to pay tribute to any particular princess from history, but rather expresses a nostalgic enthusiasm for Spanish customs and sensibilities.

ABOUT THE ORCHESTRA

Founded in 1990, the Alhambra Orchestra has as its purpose the promotion of live classical performances and of music education in Miami-Dade County. Its corporate entity, Alhambra Music, Inc., is a tax-exempt nonprofit operated and managed by volunteers who are also musicians. Thus, the orchestra has nominal administrative expenses and nearly all of its funding goes directly into programming. The orchestra has chosen to provide free concerts as much as possible, so that everyone in the community can experience its concerts without any barriers. The Alhambra Orchestra is wholly independent and not affiliated with any educational or civic institutions, although it often partners with other groups in our community. Funding comes from state and county grants, foundations, generous audience members, and the member musicians themselves, who are largely volunteers. Our highly trained musicians are diverse members of the community who earn their livings in many different occupations, but they all believe in the need for, and the power of, great music.
