Clarinetist Evan Eldridge completed a huge project for the orchestra. For West





REHEARSALS START AUGUST 16th

The Alhambra Orchestra will continue to rehearse at the UU Congregation. This is a big space, air conditioned, with plenty of parking. We are very grateful to Rev. Tom Capo, the board and congregation for agreeing to host our rehearsals. Our rehearsals will still be on *Wednesday nights at 7:30*. We'll probably end at 10, with a break in the middle.

As the date of the first rehearsal approaches, we will tell you what distancing, masking or other precautions, if any, may be needed, based on current recommendations for orchestras.

REPORT ON 2022-2023 SEASON

WOW! LOOK WHAT WE ACCOMPLISHED IN OUR 2022-23 SEASON

The orchestra began rehearsing in mid-August for an exciting new program, a Hispanic Heritage concert in Miami-Dade County Auditorium. We also had a new and challenging experience working with singers to perform West Side Story with original Broadway orchestration. Besides the live performances described below, we posted videos of selected portions of our concerts on our free YouTube channel.

SEPT. 24, 2022 - HISPANIC HERITAGE, MIAMI DADE COUNTY AUDITORIUM, 7:30 PM, FREE: Alhambra

Orchestra and Miami Dade County Auditorium co-presented a free celebration of Hispanic-inspired showpieces including Rimsky-Korsakov's Capriccio Espagnol, the lovely Concierto de Aranjuez with guitar soloist Koh Kazama from New World School of the Arts, selections from Bizet's Carmen, and popular tunes "Recuerdos de la Alhambra" and "Malaguena." A very enthusiastic crowd of 1430 attended despite rainy weather.

OCT. 30, 2022 - SPOOKY SYMPHONY, MIAMI DADE COUNTY AUDITORIUM, 4 PM, FREE. For the 14th edition of our annual free Halloween concert for local families and children, the Alhambra Orchestra partnered with the Greater Miami Youth Symphony for a fast-paced one-hour show of eerie classics and popular movie themes: Saint-Saens' Danse Macabre and Bacchanale, Gounod's Mephisto Waltz, and soundtracks from The Avengers, Gladiator, Wicked and Jurassic Park. Audience and performers wore costumes, and spooky images to accompany the music were projected on a huge screen behind the combined orchestras. Attendance was 1422. Excerpts from that performance can be seen on our YouTube channel.

NOV. 19, 2022 - ALHAMBRA QUARTET AT MIAMI CANCER CENTER, 10:30 AM, FREE. The orchestra's in-house string quartet performed a free one-hour program of light classics and popular tunes in the lobby of Miami Cancer Center, for patients and staff. The performance was also broadcast live for patients and staffers who couldn't be in the lobby at that time. Estimated attendance was 250.

DEC 15, 2022 - ELECTRIC HOLIDAYS, PINECREST GARDENS, 7 PM, FREE WITH PARK ADMISSION. The orchestra's electric strings ensemble, "Alhambra Amped" presented an hour of jazzed-up holiday classics during the Nights of Lights celebration at Pinecrest Gardens. The performance was free with admission to the Gardens. Attendance was 135.

Dec. 17, 2022 - WONDER OF CHRISTMAS, 7:30 PM, CHRIST THE KING LUTHERAN CHURCH, FREE. The "Alhambra Amped" electric strings ensemble repeated most of their

holiday performance, free, for a new audience, also joining with vocalists from the host organization for a Trans-Siberian Orchestra favorite, "Christmas Canon." Attendance was 160.

DEC 19, 2022 - ALHAMBRA QUARTET AT MIAMI CANCER CENTER, 10:30 AM, FREE. The string quartet returned to Miami Cancer Center with a one-hour free program of holiday music enthusiastically welcomed by patients and staff. About 180 patients and staff came through the lobby and listened; a recording was made to be played for inpatients, reaching about 90 more.

JAN. 8, 2023 - WORKSHOP RECITAL, UNIVERSITY OF MIAMI, 4 PM, FREE. Concluding the orchestra's annual chamber music workshop for local student and amateur musicians, the participants gave a free recital at the University of Miami's Clarke Recital Hall with works by Beethoven, Borodin, Schubert, Mozart and Haydn. Attendance was 55.

JAN. 22, 2023 - SOUTH FLORIDA'S GOT TALENT, FIU WERTHEIM PERFORMING ARTS CENTER, 7:30 PM, FREE.

The orchestra presented four young concerto competition winners as soloists, and also performed two orchestral masterworks to introduce each half of the program. Three teenaged violinists and one cellist performed famous concerti by Bruch, Tchaikovsky and Dvorak, while the orchestra alone presented Sibelius' Finlandia and two of Brahms' lively Hungarian Dances. As always, this free, popular annual event drew young friends and colleagues of the performers as well as adults from three counties where the winners resided. There were multiple curtain calls and the audience was very appreciative. Attendance was 455.

FEB 12, 2023 - LUNCH CONCERT, BOOKS & BOOKS, CORAL GABLES, 11 AM, FREE. A flute and cello duo performed light classics and popular songs during a Valentines Day brunch in the courtyard of Books & Books in Coral Gables from 11 am to 12:30pm. About 75 patrons enjoyed the performance, and many passers-by along this popular Coral Gables street also stopped to listen.

REPORT ON 2022-2023 SEASON

FEB 17 & FEB 18, 2023 - WEST SIDE STORY, PINECREST

GARDENS, 8 PM. In a dynamic partnership with Miami Acting Company, the orchestra and MAC presented a concert version of the timeless West Side Story, including dialog, and all of Bernstein's beloved songs. Transformed into a Broadway pit orchestra, symphony musicians gave a rousing performance which thrilled a total audience of 680 over two nights, and drew standing ovations. Ticket prices were a modest \$30 for adults, \$20 for seniors and students.

MARCH 5, 2023 - ALHAMBRA AMPED AT UNITARIAN CHURCH, FREE. Our electric strings group gave an informal afternoon concert of classic rock tunes for members of the Unitarian Universalist Congregation where we rehearse weekly. Attendance was 20.

MARCH 12, 2023 - GO FOR BAROQUE, CORAL GABLES CONGREGATIONAL CHURCH, 7:30 PM, FREE. Members of

the orchestra, in small ensembles, presented a curated program of multiple forms and styles of Baroque music from Germany, England, France, Italy and Spain, including a Vivaldi violin concerto. There were solo performances by UM cellist Prof. Ross Harbaugh and concertmaster Dr. Steffen Zeichner. Sponsored by the City of Coral Gables, this program drew an enthusiastic audience of 320. Audience members told us they enjoyed the different styles from so many countries.

MAY 6, 2023 - 33RD SEASON FINALE, FIU WERTHEIM PERFORMING ARTS CENTER, 7:30 PM, FREE. This Saturday evening all-Beethoven event drew 420 attendees for a rousing performance of Symphony no. 1 and Piano Concerto no. 5 with dynamic FIU Artist-in Residence Kemal Gekic as soloist. The audience included seniors who told us that they had not been to concerts in recent years and were very grateful for this free event, as well as several families with children.

HISPANIC HERITAGE CONCERT Saturday evening, Sept. 23, 2023, Miami-Dade County Auditorium -- Jointly presented with MDCA, this free season opener is a lively gift to the public featuring Spanish and Spanish-influenced favorites including Ravel's Bolero, the "Ritual Fire Dance" from DeFalla's El Amor Brujo, and Danzon No. 2 by Marquez, plus several popular Spanish songs. Last year it was extremely well received. We will have as special guests Carolina DeLeon's Doral Symphony Orchestra (all strings) who will perform two pieces to open the second half and then join us for the remainder of the program. We need to start rehearsals in mid-August to prepare this program.

SPOOKY SYMPHONY Sunday afternoon, Oct. 29, 2023, in Miami-Dade County Auditorium—Our fifteenth annual free, kid-friendly, multi-media Halloween spectacular presented in partnership with Greater Miami Youth Symphony and The Children's Trust. The combined orchestras, with musicians in costume, will present eerie classics and current movie favorites, backed by coordinated images on a huge screen.

SOUTH FLORIDA'S GOT TALENT Sunday evening, Jan. 21, 2024, in FIU's Wertheim Performing Arts Center—The top three winners of our annual concerto competition will perform their solos with the orchestra, interspersed with opera overtures by Rossini and Strauss. This is one of our most popular events.

A VISIT TO ITALY Sunday evening, Feb. 18, 2024, at Coral Gables Congregational Church—For our annual chamber concert, varied ensembles of strings and winds will present music by Italian composers including Boccherini, Vivaldi, Puccini, Rossini, Morricone, and Respighi.

OUT OF THIS WORLD Sunday afternoon, April 7, 2024 in the Moss Center (formerly SMDCAC), an exciting new venue for us. Inspired by a total solar eclipse coming up on Monday, the orchestra will partner with the Moss Center to produce a space-oriented family concert with astronomical images projected behind the orchestra. Highlights include music from Holst's Planets and from movie/TV franchises Apollo 13, Star Wars, and Star Trek, and orchestral arrangements of other space-themed works.

34th SEASON FINALE—AMERICAN CLASSICS Sunday evening, June 2, 2024, at FIU's Wertheim Performing Arts Center—We plan to close out our season with a thrilling all-American program including Rhapsody in Blue (100 years since its debut), Lincoln Portrait, and more pieces by Leonard Bernstein, Ferde Grofe, Aaron Copland and John Williams.

Besides these plans for large concerts, our Alhambra String Quartet will perform a Valentines Day program in the new Sanctuary of the Arts on Sunday afternoon Feb. 11, 2024. Alhambra Amped, our electric strings ensemble, will perform for Nights of Lights at Pinecrest Gardens in December. Both are working on additional bookings. Also, our rehearsal venue, the Unitarian Universalist Congregation, will be requesting musicians for occasional performances on Sundays. This year, we hope that we can make some school visits with trios or quartets, something we have not been allowed to do the past few years. So there will be plenty of performance opportunities for all.



PERFORMANCE AND REHEARSAL SCHEDULE

WANT TO ROCK WITH US?

For several years, some of our orchestra members have been playing in a fun-loving group we call "Alhambra Amped," consisting of amplified instruments with drums and keyboard. Its repertoire is classic rock tunes and pop music, plus patriotic and holiday tunes for various holidays. This group can play both indoors and outdoors for various events, and has performed at malls, outdoor festivals, and celebrations.





The sheet music we use is basically string quartet arrangements which we adapt a bit, adding percussion, bass and keyboard if not already scored. We are mostly electric violins, violas, and cellos – but any C instrument, whether fully electric or able to attach a pickup that plugs into an amp, is welcome. You can bring an acoustic instrument at first, if you haven't yet decided whether to venture into the electric world, or we might be able to lend you an electric one to try out. Things to consider while practicing your music...

Don't play it until you get it right, play it until you can't play it wrong.

Practice only on the days that you eat.

If you can play it slow, you can play it fast.

It is performance ready if you can play 7 times without error.

Learn things slowly and accurately first, then gradually speed things up.

HISTORICAL NOTES



Whether you are a new member or not, we want everyone to understand the history and purpose of what we do. We are

a true community orchestra, which means that our musicians are local residents and we seek to serve the needs of our community through music. In some small towns, a community orchestra is the only presenter of live classical concerts. In large cities like ours, it complements the offerings of permanent and touring professional orchestras. In the populous, sprawling Miami-Dade metropolitan area it is difficult, and cost-prohibitive, for many of our citizens to experience the excellent classical music performances that the city offers, but there is still a huge demand for concerts. That's our niche. We particularly seek to reach seniors, families with children, and underserved populations, and to encourage music education. We are proud of projects such as our annual concerto competition for youth, our annual chamber music workshop for players of all ages, our yearly Halloween family concert "Spooky Symphony," and our annual chamber music concert. The orchestra presents major symphonies, concertos with eminent local soloists, pops concerts, and children's concerts. We have an informal series of hospital visits and community center visits by small ensembles, as well. Since our management and all but a few of

the performers are volunteers, Alhambra Orchestra can do all these projects on a budget that is a small fraction of what other orchestras need.

The orchestra was founded in 1990 by Dr. Leo Walz, who was then a graduate student, and who did all the administration as well as conducting for the next several years. He incorporated it as a nonprofit in 1995, under the name "Alhambra Music, Inc." "Alhambra" was chosen because the orchestra's first home was in a now-demolished church on Alhambra Circle in Coral Gables. Since 2000, the Alhambra Orchestra has been managed by an elected board of member musicians. It is an independent, self-governing nonprofit which has formed close alliances with other arts organizations, venues, and educational institutions as, over the years, it became an important part of the cultural community. Under the leadership of Dr. Daniel Andai, our Artistic Director and principal conductor, the Alhambra Orchestra continues to improve the quality of its presentations and to reach new audiences. It serves over 6000 audience members per year. The orchestra's "can-do" attitude is exemplified by our innovative use of videos and small-ensemble programs during COVID surges, and our "Out of This World" event in 2024, a new partnership with the Moss Center

WHO'S IN CHARGE OF THIS ORCHESTRA, ANYHOW?

Short answer—the musicians are in charge! When the Alhambra Orchestra began in 1990, founder Dr. Leo Walz managed everything, as well as conducting. After a few seasons, Dr. Walz incorporated the entity as the non-profit Alhambra Music, Inc., in 1995, so that it became eligible for government grants and could request taxdeductible donations. In 2000, governance was assumed by an elected board of directors, who were all member musicians. We started receiving local government grant monies, expanding our activities, and we created the role of artistic director/conductor. Five years ago, we took the next step by expanding our board and transitioning Helen Hauser to the role of Executive Director. She handles grantwriting, strategic planning, and scheduling. All of our management is volunteer. Board members and other volunteers handle all of the behind-the-scenes tasks needed to present a full season of high-quality concerts. Artistic Director Dr. Daniel Andai plans the repertoire, designs the rehearsals, and oversees the artistic quality of our orchestra.

OUR SPECIAL MUSICAL PROJECTS

This will be the 20th year for our annual Ray Millette Memorial Concerto Competition. It began after we held a memorial ceremony for one of our original members, and to our surprise, people donated money at the event. We decided to use the funds as seed money to begin a concerto competition for local youth from four Southeast Florida counties. The top three winners get cash prizes and the opportunity to solo with our orchestra. Over the years, our competition has attracted a plethora of truly outstanding young musicians who have gone on to prestigious college and conservatory programs. One of our early successes is cellist Thomas Mesa, who graduated from Juilliard, won the Sphinx Competition, and now has a stellar career as soloist and recitalist. Indeed, we are mentioned in the recent Strings Magazine article about him. https://stringsmagazine.com/the-accidental-cellist-thomas-mesa-has-forged-an-impressive-career-after-a-lucky-mistake-led-him-to-his-instrument/ Our competition was the first such event that he won, so we can claim that we actually launched his career.

The initial round of the competition is now fully online—students post their recordings and we choose three local music educators to judge them. The top few get invited to perform live with their accompanists before three new judges, to identify the three who will be our soloists. Invitations go to local teachers, music schools, and college preparatory programs, and former competitors. Kelvin Clavelo and Sophia Camejo will be running the competition this year, so contact them if you would like to help. We need people at the final rounds to welcome the competitors, greet their families, and usher them in and out of warmup rooms. We will start accepting entries in August and conclude the finals by mid-November.

This will also be the 20th year for our annual "Be Better with Bergonzi" chamber music workshop. It began after a popular music workshop in St. Petersburg ceased its Florida programs, and local musicians were disappointed that there were no other chamber workshops within hundreds of miles. Alhambra Orchestra members Jody Atwood, Bob Gavilo and Helen Hauser asked the University of Miami's official string quartet whether they would be interested in coaching amateurs, and got an enthusiastic response. The original Bergonzi Quartet no longer performs together, but three of the original members have continued coaching our workshop. We take over the Frost School of Music for a January weekend (UM students are on winter break then) with 5-8 ensembles of amateurs and students. We study hard with our coaches, and perform a recital on Sunday afternoon. A grant from Associated Chamber Music Players allows us to waive the fees for 4-6 students from Greater Miami Youth Symphony and other music programs. Participants are mostly strings, but pianists and wind players can join in. This year the dates are January 5, 6, and 7, 2024. Contact Ruth Smith or Helen Hauser if you are interested.

MONEY MATTERS





Nearly all our concerts are free, so we can carry out our mission of making great music accessible to our entire multi-cultural community, and this is surely a time when free concerts are needed. Thus, we don't make money from admissions except for an occasional concert where we make a decision to sell tickets. We are enormously grateful for all our skilled musicians who volunteer their time, plus our volunteer management, as well as the discounts we get from venues who understand and endorse our mission. But just like any performing group, we need to pay for venue rental; insurance; music copyright and rental fees; publicity costs (yes, even for

a free concert you have to do publicity in order to get audiences); artist compensation for our section leaders, artistic director, soloists, and workshop coaches; and all the incidental expense of running a nonprofit business. This amounts to almost \$100,000 in cash expenses for each of our recent, very active performing seasons. We are funded by government grants, local foundations, and individual donations. We ask our member musicians to help cover the operating costs by paying a modest \$160 per year in dues, a number which we recently raised by only \$10 because of ongoing inflation. So, those who can afford to do so are asked to donate a sum above these very minimal dues. The basic dues amount works out to about \$4 for each time you enjoy the benefit of working with our terrific conductor and congenial musicians. If possible, please bring your checks to the first rehearsal so we can start the year with some funding to carry us until grant money comes in. You can also pay online through our website, or by Venmo, @Alhambra-Orchestra. We are a 501(c)(3) tax exempt organization so if you donate above your dues, we can give you a receipt for your donations that will be handy at tax time. Fulltime students are exempt from paying dues. Anyone who has difficulty paying \$160 is welcome to have a confidential discussion with our treasurer, Janet Copeland, who can give you a break.
